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Semi-Annual Letter to Issachar Fund (LIONX & LIOTX) Shareholders

Dear Valued Issachar Fund Shareholders,

March 31, 2023

Welcome to our semi-annual Issachar Fund shareholder report for the 6-month period ended 3/31/23.

The Issachar Fund (LIONX) was down -5.07%, while the IQ Hedge Multi-Strategy Index (IQX) was up 7.65% in the last six months (9/30/22 to 3/31/23). LIONX underperformed its benchmark (IQX) because its growth stock positions lost more than the short-term bonds held by IQX. We saw indications of a market bottom in January, so we purchased growth stocks, but they were quickly sold as prices declined and sell stops were triggered. This type of in-and-out activity trying to manage risk happened several times, resulting in a net loss for the last six months ending 3/31/23. We have tightened our sell triggers, expecting to lose less if this type of whip-saw action continues.

We believe the best way to keep up with the declining purchasing power of our dollar caused by inflation is to invest in growth stocks in the right environment. Last year's bear market resulted in net losses of -18% to -33% in the major indexes. LIONX fared much better than the indexes last year because we actively manage risk instead of buying and holding an index.

There is an unprecedented amount of economic and political risk on the horizon, and we believe the risk up to the 2024 election could be life-changing if things go in the wrong direction. We are optimistic mainly because the Fed has started the printing presses again. The Fed may have mitigated a "run on the banks," but expanding its balance sheet in an inflationary period may increase the same inflation they claim to be fighting. I plan to continue managing risk and stay in sync with the trend.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Unaudited)

March 31, 2023

I. ORGANIZATION

The Issachar Fund (the “Fund”) is a series of shares of beneficial interest of Northern Lights Fund Trust III (the “Trust”), a Delaware statutory trust organized on December 5, 2011. The Trust is an open-end management investment company registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended (the “1940 Act”). The Fund currently offers Class N and Class I shares. Class N shares commenced operations on February 28, 2014. Class I shares commenced operations on February 22, 2021. The Fund is a diversified fund. The investment objective of the Fund is moderate capital appreciation consistent with capital preservation.

Shares of the Fund, when issued, are fully paid, nonassessable, fully transferable, redeemable at the option of the shareholder and have equal dividend and liquidity rights. Each class of the Fund represents an interest in the same assets of the Fund and the classes are identical except for differences in their distribution charges. Both classes have equal voting privileges except that Class N shares has exclusive voting rights with respect to its service and/or distribution plan. The Fund’s income, expenses (other than class specific distribution fees) and realized and unrealized gains and losses are allocated proportionately each day based upon the relative net assets of each class.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies consistently followed by the Fund in the preparation of its financial statements. The policies are in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (“GAAP”), which require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of increases and decreases in net assets from operations during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. The Fund is an investment company and accordingly follows the investment company accounting and reporting guidance of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (“FASB”) Accounting Standards Codification Topic 946 “Financial Services – Investment Companies” and Accounting Standards Update (“ASU”) 2013-08.

Securities Valuation – Securities listed on an exchange are valued at the last reported sale price at the close of the regular trading session of the exchange on the business day the value is being determined, or in the case of securities listed on NASDAQ at the NASDAQ Official Closing Price (“NOCP”). If the NOCP is not available, such securities shall be valued at the last sale price on the day of valuation, or if there has been no sale on such day, at the mean between the current bid and ask prices. Debt securities (other than short-term obligations) are valued each day by an independent pricing service approved by the Trust’s Board of Trustees (the “Board”) using methods which include current market quotations from a major market maker in the securities and based on methods which include the consideration of yields or prices of securities of comparable quality, coupon, maturity and type. Swap transactions are valued through an independent pricing service or at fair value based on daily price reporting from the swap counterparty based on the proprietary index. The independent pricing service does not distinguish between smaller-sized bond positions known as “odd lots” and larger institutional-sized bond positions known as “round lots”. The Fund may fair value a particular bond if the advisor does not believe that the round lot value provided by the independent pricing service reflects fair value of the Fund’s holding. Short-term debt obligations having 60 days or less remaining until maturity, at time of purchase, may be valued at amortized cost, which approximates fair value.

The Fund may hold securities, such as private investments, interests in commodity pools, other non-traded securities or temporarily illiquid securities, for which market quotations are not readily available or are determined to be unreliable. These securities will be valued using the “fair value” procedures approved by the Board. The Board may also enlist third party consultants such as a valuation specialist at a public accounting firm, valuation consultant or financial officer of a security issuer on an as-needed basis to assist in determining a security-specific fair value. The Board reviews the execution of this process and the resultant fair value prices at least quarterly to assure the process produces reliable results.

Valuation of Investment Funds - The Fund may invest in portfolios of open-end or closed-end investment companies (the “Underlying Funds”). The Underlying Funds value securities in their portfolios for which market quotations are readily available at their market values (generally the last reported sale price) and all other securities and assets at their fair value to the methods established by the board of directors of the Underlying Funds.

Open-end investment companies are valued at their respective net asset values as reported by such investment companies. The shares of many closed-end investment companies, after their initial public offering, frequently trade at a price per share, which is different than the net asset value per share. The difference represents a market premium or market discount of such shares. There can be no assurances that the market discount or market premium on shares of any closed-end investment company purchased by the Fund will not change.

Fair Valuation Process — Fair value determinations are required for the following securities: (i) securities for which market quotations are insufficient or not readily available on a particular business day (including securities for which there is a short and temporary lapse in the provision of a price by the regular pricing source); (ii) securities for which, in the judgment of the Board, the prices or values available do not represent the fair value of the instrument. Factors which may cause the Board to make such a judgment include, but are not limited to, the following: only a bid price or an ask price is available; the spread between bid and ask prices is substantial; the frequency of sales; the thinness of the market; the size of reported trades; and actions of the securities markets, such as the suspension or limitation of trading; (iii) securities determined to be illiquid; (iv) securities with respect to which an event that will affect the value thereof has occurred (a “significant event”) since the closing prices were established on the principal exchange on which they are traded, but prior to the Fund’s calculation of its net asset value. Specifically, interests in commodity pools or managed futures pools are valued on a daily basis by reference to the closing market prices of each futures contract or other asset held by a pool, as adjusted for pool expenses. Restricted or illiquid securities, such as private investments or non-traded securities are valued via inputs from the advisor based upon the current bid for the security from two or more independent dealers or other parties reasonably familiar with the facts and circumstances of the security (who should take into consideration all relevant factors as may be appropriate under the circumstances). If the Board is unable to obtain a current bid from such independent dealers or other independent parties, it shall determine the fair value of such security using the following factors: (i) the type of security; (ii) the cost at date of purchase; (iii) the size and nature of the Fund’s holdings; (iv) the discount from market value of unrestricted securities of the same class at the time of purchase and subsequent thereto; (v) information as to any transactions or offers with respect to the security; (vi) the nature and duration of restrictions on disposition of the security and the existence of any registration rights; (vii) how the yield of the security compares to similar securities of companies of similar or equal creditworthiness; (viii) the level of recent trades of similar or comparable securities; (ix) the liquidity characteristics of the security; (x) current market conditions; and (xi) the market value of any securities into which the security is convertible or exchangeable.

The Fund utilizes various methods to measure the fair value of all of its investments on a recurring basis. GAAP establishes a hierarchy that prioritizes inputs to valuation methods. The three levels of input are:

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and liabilities that the Fund has the ability to access.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These inputs may include quoted prices for the identical instrument in an inactive market, prices for similar instruments, interest rates, prepayment speeds, credit risk, yield curves, default rates and similar data.

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability, to the extent relevant observable inputs are not available, representing the Fund’s own assumptions about the assumptions a market participant would use in valuing the asset or liability, and would be based on the best information available.

The availability of observable inputs can vary from security to security and is affected by a wide variety of factors, including, for example, the type of security, whether the security is new and not yet established in the marketplace, the liquidity of markets and other characteristics particular to the security. To the extent that valuation is based on models or inputs that are less observable or unobservable in the market, the determination of fair value requires more judgment. Accordingly, the degree of

judgment exercised in determining fair value is greatest for instruments categorized in Level 3.

The inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, for disclosure purposes, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement falls in its entirety, is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety.

The inputs or methodology used for valuing securities are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with investing in those securities. The following tables summarize the inputs used as of March 31, 2023, for the Fund's investments measured at fair value:

The Fund did not hold any Level 3 securities during the period. There were no transfers between levels during the period.

Security Transactions and Related Income – Security transactions are accounted for on the trade date. Interest income is recognized on an accrual basis. Discounts are accreted and premiums are amortized on securities purchased over the lives of the respective securities. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Realized gains or losses from sales of securities are determined by comparing the identified cost of the security lot sold with the net sales proceeds.

Dividends and Distributions to Shareholders – Dividends from net investment income, if any, are declared and paid quarterly and distributions from net realized capital gains if any, are declared and paid annually. Dividends and distributions to shareholders are recorded on the ex-dividend date and are determined in accordance with federal income tax regulations, which may differ from GAAP. These “book/tax” differences are considered either temporary (e.g., deferred losses, capital loss carryforwards) or permanent in nature. To the extent these differences are permanent in nature, such amounts are reclassified within the composition of net assets based on their federal tax-basis treatment; temporary differences do not require reclassification. These reclassifications have no effect on net assets, results from operations or net asset values per share of the Fund.

Exchange Traded Funds – The Fund may invest in exchange traded funds (“ETFs”). ETFs are a type of fund that are bought and sold on a securities exchange. An ETF trades like common stock and represents a fixed portfolio of securities. The Fund may purchase an ETF to gain exposure to a portion of the U.S. or a foreign market. The risks of owning an ETF generally reflect the risks of owning the underlying securities in which the ETF invests, although the lack of liquidity on an ETF could result in it being more volatile. Additionally, ETFs have fees and expenses that reduce their value.

Expenses – Expenses of the Trust that are directly identifiable to a specific fund are charged to that fund. Expenses, which are not readily identifiable to a specific fund, are allocated in such a manner as deemed equitable, taking into consideration the nature and type of expense and the relative sizes of the funds in the Trust.

Market Risk – Market risk is the risk that changes in interest rates, foreign exchange rates or equity prices will affect the positions held by the Fund. The Fund is exposed to market risk on financial instruments that are valued at market prices as disclosed in the Schedule of Investments. The prices of derivative instruments, including options, forwards and futures prices, can be highly volatile. Price movements of derivative contracts in which the Fund's assets may be invested are influenced by, among other things, interest rates, changing supply and demand relationships, trade, fiscal, monetary and

exchange control programs and policies of governments, and national and international political and economic events and policies.

Credit Risk – Credit risk relates to the ability of the issuer to meet interest and principal payments, or both, as they come due. In general, lower-grade, higher-yield bonds are subject to credit risk to a greater extent than lower-yield, higher-quality bonds.

Counterparty Risk – Counterparty risk is the risk that the counterparty to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the Fund by failing to discharge an obligation. A concentration of counterparty risk can exist in that the part of a Fund's cash can be held at the broker.

Indemnification – The Trust indemnifies its officers and Trustees for certain liabilities that may arise from the performance of their duties to the Trust. Additionally, in the normal course of business, the Fund enters into contracts that contain a variety of representations and warranties and which provide general indemnities. The Fund's maximum exposure under these arrangements is unknown, as this would involve future claims that may be made against the Fund that have not yet occurred. However, based on experience, the risk of loss due to these warranties and indemnities appears to be remote.

3. INVESTMENT TRANSACTIONS

For the six months ended March 31, 2023, cost of purchases and proceeds from sales of portfolio securities, excluding short-term investments, amounted to \$112,960,131 and \$103,126,998, respectively.

5. INVESTMENT ADVISORY AGREEMENT AND TRANSACTIONS WITH RELATED PARTIES

Horizon Capital Management, Inc. serves as the Fund's investment advisor (the "Advisor").

Pursuant to an investment advisory agreement with the Trust, on behalf of the Fund, the Advisor, under the oversight of the Board, directs the daily operations of the Fund and supervises the performance of administrative and professional services provided by others. As compensation for its services and the related expenses borne by the Advisor, the Fund pays the Advisor a management fee, computed and incurred daily and paid monthly, at an annual rate of 1.00% of the Fund's average daily net assets.

Pursuant to a written agreement (the "Waiver Agreement") the Advisor agreed to waive its fees and/or reimburse the Fund's operating expenses through January 31, 2023, so that the total annual operating expenses (exclusive of any front-end or contingent deferred loads, brokerage fees and commissions, acquired fund fees and expenses, borrowing costs (such as interest and dividend expense on securities sold short), taxes and extraordinary expenses, such as litigation expenses (which may include indemnification of Fund officers and Trustees, contractual indemnification of Fund service providers (other than the Advisor))) of the Fund did not exceed 1.90% of average daily net assets attributable to Class N shares and 1.65% of average daily net assets

attributable to Class I shares (the “Expense Limitation”). During the six months ended March 31, 2023, the Advisor earned advisory fees of \$122,357 and waived fees in the amount of \$49,319 pursuant to the Waiver Agreement. The fees paid to the Advisor are reviewed annually by the Board. Effective February 1, 2023, the Expense Limitation was eliminated.

The Trust, on behalf of the Fund, has adopted the Trust’s Master Distribution and Shareholder Servicing Plan (the “Plan”). The Plan provides that a monthly service and/or distribution fee is calculated by the Fund at an annual rate of up to 0.25% of its average daily net assets attributable to Class N shares and is paid to Northern Lights Distributors, LLC (the “Distributor”) to provide compensation for ongoing shareholder servicing and distribution-related activities or services and/or maintenance of the Fund’s shareholder accounts not otherwise required to be provided by the Advisor. For the six months ended March 31, 2023, the Fund incurred \$16,425 in total fees under the Plan.

The Distributor acts as the Fund’s principal underwriter in a continuous public offering of the Fund shares. During the six months ended March 31, 2023, the Distributor received no underwriting commissions.

In addition, certain affiliates of the Distributor provide services to the Fund as follows:

Ultimus Fund Solutions, LLC (“UFS”), an affiliate of the Distributor, provides administration, fund accounting, and transfer agent services to the Trust. Pursuant to separate servicing agreements with UFS, the Fund pays UFS customary fees for providing administration, fund accounting and transfer agency services to the Trust. Certain officers of the Trust are also officers of UFS, and are not paid any fees directly by the Fund for serving in such capacities.

Northern Lights Compliance Services, LLC (“NLCS”), an affiliate of UFS and the Distributor, provides a Chief Compliance Officer to the Trust, as well as related compliance services, pursuant to a consulting agreement between NLCS and the Trust. Under the terms of such agreement, NLCS receives customary fees from the Fund.

Blu Giant, LLC (“Blu Giant”), an affiliate of UFS and the Distributor, provides EDGAR conversion and filing services as well as print management services for the Fund on an ad-hoc basis. For the provision of these services, Blu Giant receives customary fees from the Fund.

6. FEDERAL INCOME TAXES NOTE

It is the Fund’s policy to qualify as a regulated investment company by complying with the provisions of Subchapter M of the Internal Revenue Code that are applicable to regulated investment companies and to distribute substantially all of its taxable income and net realized gains to shareholders. Therefore, no federal income tax provision is required.

The Fund recognizes the tax benefits of uncertain tax positions only when the position is “more likely than not” to be sustained assuming examination by tax authorities. Management has analyzed the Fund tax positions, and has concluded that no liability for unrecognized tax benefits should be recorded related to uncertain tax positions taken on returns filed for the open tax years of 2020 through 2022, or expected to be taken in the Fund’s September 30, 2023 tax returns. The Fund identifies its major tax jurisdictions as U.S. federal, Ohio and foreign jurisdictions where the Fund makes significant investments. The Fund is not aware of any tax positions for which it is reasonably possible that the total amounts of unrecognized tax benefits will change materially in the next twelve months.

8. UNDERLYING INVESTMENT IN OTHER INVESTMENT COMPANIES

The Fund currently seeks to achieve its investment objective by investing a significant portion of its assets in Fidelity Institutional Money Market Fund – Government Portfolio- Class I, a registered open-end investment company (“Fidelity”). The Fund may redeem its investment from Fidelity at any time if the Advisor determines that it is in the best interest of the Fund and its shareholders to do so.

The performance of the Fund will be directly affected by the performance of Fidelity. The annual reports of Fidelity, along with the report of the independent registered public accounting firm is included in Fidelity’s N-CSR available at “www.sec.gov” or on the website “www.Fidelity.com”. As of March 31, 2023, the percentage of the Fund’s net assets invested in Fidelity was 80.9%.

9. CONTROL OWNERSHIP

The beneficial ownership, either directly or indirectly, of more than 25% of the voting securities of a fund creates presumption of control of the fund under Section 2(a)(9) of the 1940 Act. As of March 31, 2023, Constellation Trust Company (for the benefit of its customers) held approximately 43.5% of the voting securities of the Fund.

10. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events after the date of the Statement of Assets and Liabilities have been evaluated through the date the financial issues were issued. Management has determined that no events or transactions occurred requiring adjustment or disclosure in the financial statements.

Renewal of Advisory Agreement – Issachar Fund*

In connection with a meeting held on November 29-30, 2022, the Board, including a majority of the Trustees who are not “interested persons,” as that term is defined in the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended, discussed the renewal of the investment advisory agreement (the “Advisory Agreement”) between the Adviser and the Trust, with respect to the Issachar Fund (“Issachar”). In considering the renewal of the Advisory Agreement, the Board received materials specifically relating to Issachar and the Advisory Agreement.

The Board relied upon the advice of independent legal counsel and its own business judgment in determining the material factors to be considered in evaluating the Advisory Agreement and the weight to be given to each such factor. The Board’s conclusions were based on an evaluation of all of the information provided and were not the result of any one factor. Moreover, each Trustee may have afforded different weight to the various factors in reaching conclusions with respect to the Advisory Agreement.

Nature, Extent and Quality of Services. The Board acknowledged that the portfolio manager was highly experienced in managing assets. The Board observed that the Adviser used a “chart analysis” investment approach that sought capital preservation during periods of high risk and capital appreciation during periods of low risk. The Board noted that the Adviser was committed to maintaining strong risk management discipline and active management style aimed at preserving capital consistent with the Issachar’s investment objective. The Board recognized that the Adviser selected broker-dealers based on an annual evaluation of factors including but not limited to fees, research, pricing, liquidity, reputation, financial stability, and responsiveness. The Board discussed that the Adviser was disciplined in its implementation of its Biblically responsible investment screening process. The Board determined that it could expect the Adviser to continue providing quality services to Issachar and its shareholders.

Performance. The Board recognized that Issachar earned a 3-star Morningstar rating and had outperformed its peer group, Morningstar category, and the IQ Hedge Multi-Strategy Total Return Index over the 1-year and 3-year periods. The Board noted that Issachar underperformed its peer group and Morningstar category over the 5-year and since inception periods but outperformed the IQ Hedge Multi-Strategy Total Return Index over the same periods. The Board considered that Issachar’s standard deviation ranked in the first or second quartile among its peer group and Morningstar category across all periods. The Board acknowledged the Adviser’s explanation that several trades in 2021 were the largest detractors from Issachar’s performance. The Board agreed that the Adviser remained committed to Issachar’s Biblically responsible investment approach. The Board concluded that the Adviser had provided reasonable returns for Issachar’s shareholders.

Fees and Expenses. The Board noted that Issachar’s advisory fee was higher than the medians and averages of its Morningstar category and peer group but below the highs of each. The Board remarked that Issachar’s net expense ratio was higher than the medians and averages of its peer group and Morningstar category but below the highs of each. The Board discussed the Adviser’s position that its fees were attributable to the unique skills required to actively manage the strategy of Issachar, which were uncommon in the mutual fund industry and more common in managing hedge funds. The Board concluded that the Adviser’s advisory fee for Issachar was not unreasonable.

Economies of Scale. The Board considered whether economies of scale had been reached with respect to the management of Issachar. The Board noted that the Adviser had indicated a willingness to continue to evaluate the appropriateness of breakpoints when Issachar reached higher assets. The Board agreed to monitor and revisit the issue at the appropriate time.

Profitability. The Board reviewed the Adviser’s profitability analysis in connection with its management of Issachar. The Board acknowledged that the Adviser earned a very modest profit in actual dollars and as a percentage of revenue. The Board concluded that the Adviser’s profitability was not excessive.

Conclusion. Having requested and reviewed such information from the Adviser as the Board believed to be reasonably necessary to evaluate the terms of the Advisory Agreement, and as assisted by the advice of independent

counsel, the Board concluded that renewal of the Advisory Agreement was in the best interests of Issachar and its shareholders.

LIQUIDITY RISK MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

The Fund has adopted and implemented a written liquidity risk management program as required by Rule 22e-4 (the “Liquidity Rule”) under the Investment Company Act. The program is reasonably designed to assess and manage the Fund’s liquidity risk, taking into consideration, among other factors, the Fund’s investment strategies and the liquidity of its portfolio investments during normal and reasonably foreseeable stressed conditions; its short and long-term cash flow projections; and its cash holdings and access to other funding sources.

During the six month period ended March 31, 2023, the Board and the Trust’s Liquidity Risk Management Program Committee (the “Committee”) reviewed the Fund’s investments and they determined that the Fund held adequate levels of cash and highly liquid investments to meet shareholder redemption activities in accordance with applicable requirements. Accordingly, the Board and Committee concluded that (i) the Fund’s liquidity risk management program is reasonably designed to prevent violations of the Liquidity Rule and (ii) the Fund’s liquidity risk management program has been effectively implemented.
